

A day in the life of Miss America 2003. Erika Harold, with Reservations

Monday, November 17th was a really big day for WWGP. We had worked feverishly to complete the arrangements for Miss America. 2003. Erika Harold to come and talk to our kids.

Miss Harold had flown into Austin Straubel airport the night before from a speaking engagement in another city. She told me that she hadn't been home for nearly a month, and had a few days to go before she would be done with the speaking engagements on this tour, but that she was really excitid to come to the two Native Reservations to speak with our students on the issues that she is so passionate about.

Chris Powless and drove to Neopit's Menominee Tribal School where Miss Harold spoke to the middle schoolers about the importance of the choice to remain abstinent and to make other healthy decisions

such as avoiding alcohol, tobacco and drugs. She was greeted at the school by a traditional honor song done by the youth drumming and singing group. The Tribal Royalty was on hand to welcome her with traditional native-crafted gifts, words of tribute and rich smiles.

Miss Harold delivered a dynamic presentation and held the attention of the crowd with her stories about how and why she came to run for Miss America. She revealed many poignant details about her life. The students were interested to learn that she is of multi-cultural and multi-racial background, including Cherokee

descent. She shared a story about when she was bullied in school, and another about a friend who endured an abusive relationship. She explained how she was determined to achieve success in school and that she decided not to get involved in things that would not build that success. She talked to them about goals and dreams for their futures and how to create the pathway to those goals and dreams.

She then got to speak with the grade school students and talked with them on the subject of bullying. She also got them to share some of their hopes for their futures and talked to them about how important it is to work toward those goals and to be careful not to engage in actions that might place barriers in the path of reaching those goals.

At 11:30, we were on the road again to Oneida to meet with the Oneida Business Committee for a wonderful luncheon of Traditional Oneida White Corn Soup, fried bread, and other delicious foods. Business Committee Secretary, Julie Barton began by giving an inspiring and heartfelt welcome address. The Tribal Royalty of Oneida was on hand to extend a warm welcome and to present her with traditional, cultural gifts. Miss Green Bay. 2003. Laura Kolar was there to meet our guest as well and said that meeting Erika was the highlight of her reign.

From there, Miss Harold delivered a riveting talk to the Oneida Nation High School, interacting with the students by asking them about their future plans and encouraging them to stay on track by working hard in school, competing in athletics and keeping their goals foremost in their mind.

We continued to the Oneida Turtle School. where Miss Harold conveyed her message of healthy goals and stories of her experiences to the elementary students and then again to the middle schoolers, Each time, Miss Harold was able to deliver fresh and inspiring ideas and connected on point with the groups.

We wrapped up the day with a public presentation at the Brown County Library followed by a video taping session with NEWIST Cesa 7 where Erika was interviewed by Eileen Littig on the subject of bullying.

Wow, by my count that is 9 presentations! Every time. Miss Harold was able to redesign her talk and uniquely tailor her topics to the groups she was addressing. Each time, she used a new approach and came across to her audiences as wise and sincere. WWGP and the Menominee, Oneida and Green Bay communities were all delighted with both the messages and the messenger.



When I returned Miss Harold to her hotel room that night, she told me that she was flying to Montana for a presentation the next morning and then to Pittsburgh for an event the following day. She said that she was looking forward to returning home for Thanksgiving and some down time with her family.



Discovery Dating © is a relationship development tool to assist people of all ages, but particularly teenagers, to help them develop the personal skills they will need to make informed relationship decisions. It replaces candy and flowers with work sheets and

flash cards to prod couples into discussing critical compatibility issues at the beginning of a relationship. This kit doesn't have to be limited to studying intimate relationships, it can be used to learn about your friends, too. The art of discernment is very important in

any type of relationship. If you learn to distinguish the difference between safe behaviors and risky behaviors in your acquaintances, you will be much more likely to make good decisions about the activities you should and should not join with these people.

You may have noticed, if you are familiar with the Discovery Dating kit, that it is now sporting a brand new logo. We are very proud to have this new design and wish to thank Ryan T. Peters, talented computer technician, for contributing this great new look to the pages of the kit.

This year, we have a new set of students learning about relationship development with this kit, the 8th grades at Oneida and Menominee have just finished the classroom sessions, and now have to complete diary sheets and pyramids on three people. Once the students complete this, they will receive certificates of completion, so, if you are mentoring one of our students, please be sure to check on their progress and encourage them to stay on task.



Community-Based Abstinence Program

ne facet of the C-BAC program is the practice of introducing young people to new experiences in life, helping them to see the boundless possibilities in the world that are available to them. Through out the year, C-BAC educator/ advocates bring in quest speakers to share experiences about their careers with the students. C-BAC provided the students with the opportunity to experience all aspects of producing a theater production, which, by all accounts, was a smash hit with the youngsters and the community. C-BAC also takes the young people on tour to various businesses and events to involve them in many new opportunities, we will soon take the students on a trip to the University of Green Bay Campus to visit the TV studio, and participate in the making of Teen Connection. We recently took 9 former C-BAC students from our high schools to Upham Woods at Wisconsin Dells to participate in the WAIY training conference. Our goal in continuing these activities is to give these young people ideas for "higher aspirations" and to help them develop a feeling of comfort in many different settings. At the upcoming Native DREAMS Summer Camp, twenty of our students will participate in the writing, performance, recording and editing of a television broadcast-ready production about healthy choices. These types of exposures, we believe, will enable our youth to have a broader field of choices when making decisions about their careers, their relationships, and their futures. Ten Principles of MOTHER-INFANT BOND-ING TO CHANGE THE

WORLDJames W. Prescott, Ph.D. April 1989

- 1. Every pregnancy is a wanted pregnancy. Every child is a wanted child.
- 2. Every pregnancy has proper nutrition and prenatal care.
- 3. **Natural birthing** Mother controls birthing position with *no* separation of newborn from mother.
- 4. No genital mutilation.
- 5. Breastfeeding on demand for at least 2 years.
- 6. **Intimate body contact** is maintained between mother and newborn.
- 7. **Immediate comforting** is given to infants and children who are crying.
- 8. **Infants and children are for hugging** and should never be physically hit for any reason.
- 9. **Infants and children are honored** and should never be humiliated nor emotionally abused for any reason.
- 10. **Mothers must be honored** and not replaced by institutional care.

True 2 Life gives inspiration to NE Wisconsin youth... Six young people from around the state came together to give a presentation on the subject of Abstinence. WWGP asked for them to come and talk with our C-BAC youth because they have spent the entire year traveling all over Wisconsin telling students about their personal reasons for making the choice to remain abstinent. They are engaged by the Aids Resource Center of Wisconsin to perform a year long public speaking tour

promoting abstinence.

Abbey says, "There are a lot of reasons to be abstinent, and I'm passionate about a lot of them, but one of my own personal reasons for not having sex till I'm married is that I just plain don't want to get sick. Camille told us that, "As a teenage mother, it's difficult to live life to the fullest, going to college full time and bee a parent full time. My stress level is extreme. I feel it is my duty to tell my peers that it can happen, but they can prevent it. I am abstinent because I do not want more stress. London said, "I have a lot of younger cousins that look up to me and if I am setting the right example, they will more likely follow in my footsteps. Peter told us, "I am abstinent because of my personal beliefs in God. I believe that sex is something very personal, and should only be shared by people who are married. When taken out of marriage, sex is meaningless." **Rosanna** stated, "A few moments of pleasure can affect a person for a lifetime. They can never forget what happened no matter how hard they try." **Nicole** said her reasons for being abstinent were, "based on personal experience with the emotional consequences of sex before marriage. I made the decision to become abstinent because I know not having sex will prevent me from getting an STD, a pregnancy or suffering more of the emotional consequences. I also wanted to provide support for teens that have had sex, and let them know that you can always make the decision to start over."

In addition to the words of wisdom these young people shared, they engaged their audiences (and they presented to five different audiences in that day), with humor, and clever wit, calling upon the students to take part in their presentation. During their appearance, they invited two from the audience, a boy and a girl to help them demonstrate how much you lose when you give you most special possessions away to someone who is not going to be with you forever. Together they created a poignant moment for everyone.

Answer: One thousand.

1st Annual National SisterSong Reproductive Health & Sexual Rights Conference

Atlanta, GA, November, 2003

WWGP's Director, Alice Skenandore, attended this conference as a presenter and panel member. WWGP's presented as a panel member on the subjects of Abstinence education, Traditional Midwifery & Breastfeeding and announced to an audience of over 600 women of color from across the nation the formation of the Indigenous Birth Network (IBN). IBN will address the important need for Indigenous peoples to reclaim their traditional birthing practices, as a way of returning to family and community values and connectedness.

Alice, who was featured on the front page of the "Collective Voices" Conference newsletter, produced by Sararesa Begay, is quoted, "I am glad to come to the SisterSong conference this year, because I believe that this is a forum for people who have diverse views to discuss the issues of reproductive health choices and rights." "It has been a great sorrow to me that other reproductive health rights such as home birth, breast-feeding, midwifery and abstinence have traditionally been ignored by the mainstream women's reproductive rights movements in the past.."
